Two more ladies have joined the ranks of Rea of Hope Graduates: Lindsay H. and Donna W. Neither lady was a stranger to struggling with addiction and being unsuccessful at their own attempts at recovery. Rea of Hope offers a great balance of structure, love and support while teaching life skill classes to promote the development of self-sufficiency. Lindsay and Donna embraced all we offered and have transitioned to our New Life Apartments to continue working on their recovery.

Lindsay H. came to us with a little hope and a lot of doubt! Lindsay stated she had "hit bottom" and was willing to try recovery. She shared that she had lost everything except her life and the life she had wasn't really worth living. Addiction had robbed her of self-worth, self-esteem, her dreams and most devastating of all her 4 children. A wonderful and dedicated Probation Officer saw the good in Lindsay and encouraged her to go into treatment. Lindsay followed his suggestion, went to treatment, went on to long term treatment and then decided to come to Rea of Hope. She began to feel like she wanted to live and change her life. Today, Lindsay accepts that as long as she remains sober she has the hope that her children will one day be in her life; she knows that if she does not remain sober there is NO HOPE for that. At first, Lindsay was reluctant to join in the group but then she began to work the 12 steps with her sponsor and her reluctance changed to willingness. Instead of remaining a follower, Lindsay is now to be a leader!

Donna W. came to us desperate to try one more time at recovery. Of course, the longer we have abused drugs and/or alcohol, the more we have damaged ourselves. Donna had been "using and abusing" for more than 2/3's of her life; needless to say, she had a lot of issues to come to terms with. Donna adjusted here very slowly and had a difficult time with changing her behavior, but she was willing to go to any lengths. It seemed as though one day Donna's countenance suddenly changed and hope replaced despair. Donna began smiling and realizing that this "program stuff" might just work! Again, addiction removed Donna's girls from her custody but today she gets to see her girls and work on their relationship. Donna has so many wonderful qualities and watching her grow into the caring woman she is today has been a blessing.

Thank you ladies for letting Rea of Hope be a part of your journey in recovery.

Christmas in July, hosted by Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church....... It truly felt like Christmas; we were over whelmed with the generosity of gifts and the brunch that followed the service. The women felt so welcome and really enjoyed being with the members of Trinity. The congregation donated \$335 for movie night that will cover the next Girls Night Out, cash donations of \$570 that helped purchase a new refrigerator (we had to replace one when we got back from the service), sheets, towels, paper products, umbrellas, one vacuum cleaner, laundry detergent, dryer sheets, garbage bags, and knit hats for the kids. These donations will save Rea of Hope countless dollars over the next several months.

It is true many lose their lives to this disease but help is available. Help is not only needed for the addict/alcoholic but the family as well. I can't tell you how many family members I speak to who are in crisis over their loved one and desperate to do anything to help EXCEPT to get help for themselves. I use the example of when you are flying, the instructions for safety are for the adult to put on their oxygen mask first so they can help their child; otherwise both may perish. Please remember it is not selfish to help yourself first, it is a matter of survival and may save both your lives.

Rea of Hope has enjoyed much success over the last 11 plus years; directly serving 44 counties, over 340 women and 80 children. We have grown and adapted as we defined the needs of our residents. Expanding our program and opening New Life Apartments in 2008 and 2011 have been and is a lifesaving option for our graduates. Through our follow up program we have been able to document the following outcomes. As you can see, the longer we can engage our graduates in a safe supportive environment the better the odds. The success levels are amazing and well over the national averages. What does all this mean? It means women are getting better, staying clean and sober, working, paying taxes, staying out of the judicial system, being mothers and productive members of their communities. Thank you for your investment in their future and the future of their children, mothers, fathers, employers, friends and neighbors.

Appalachian Power helps Rea of Hope save money on energy bills!!!!

Rea of Hope is partnering with Appalachian Power and engaged in HomeSMART Energy Assessments at the residences, Aug. 18. The program helps identify areas of the home that may be wasting valuable energy by providing an in-home energy assessment. "We are proud to help Rea of Hope in this effort," said Zack Bacon,

Appalachian Power energy efficiency coordinator. "By performing these audits, Rea of Hope can save money on their energy bills, which in turn can be used by the group to help more individuals."

The HomeSMART Energy Assessment is available to eligible Appalachian Power residential customers in West Virginia. Under the program, an energy specialist is sent to examine the home, generate a custom report on the home and install simple, low-cost energy efficient improvements with the homeowner's permission.

This basic energy assessment is provided to eligible residential customers' free-of-charge. Eligible residential customers can also elect to pay a nominal fee to receive a more in depth energy analysis of their home.

The teams from AEP were wonderful and spent hours at each site providing \$100's of dollars in energy saving light bulbs, shower heads, faucets, etc. We are very grateful and look forward to saving money and energy.
